Supported Housing

Community Campus 87 provides supported housing across Middlesbrough, Stockton and Hartlepool. We have seventy two-bed spaces made up of self-contained flats and houses and larger shared houses.

Our model of support is based upon developing a positive relationship working collaboratively with an individual, building belief that change is possible and understanding that setbacks are part of the journey to independence.

The residents in our service have experienced periods of homelessness, or unstable, unsecure housing and due to their lifestyle and housing history have limited housing options.

Many of our residents have multiple support needs and we take a holistic approach which helps to identify the links between the different areas of a person's life as social challenges do not occur in isolation.

Each resident has their own key worker and their own individual tailor-made support plan which has been constructed collaboratively taking into account an individual's priorities, strengths and capabilities.

Campus Case Study Ethau



Campus is the staff, who offer me non-stop support and help with any problems that I may have ??

From living in a tent in his father's garden to sleeping on friends' sofas, Ethan has had a very unsettled journey in terms of finding a stable place to make his home. After suffering traumatic experiences in his childhood, Ethan has struggled with his emotions and how to manage how he feels within his everyday life.

Ethan reached out to Community Campus as a worried eighteen year old who had no real understanding of how to manage on his own. The housing and support workers at CC87 have now worked with Ethan for nearly two years transitioning him from a large shared property to a single tenancy. Ethan had in the initial stages a distrust of CC87 housing and support workers, borne out of his experience with statutory services who he felt let down by and identified him as, 'another difficult child'. This meant that building relationships with the CC87 staff was a long process with its ups and downs, however the consistency and dedication to Ethan from the support staff was enough to allow Ethan to let down his barriers he had spent so long building.

The Community Campus staff were able to show to Ethan that regardless of past experiences, if he was able to allow a little trust and combine that with good engagement within support sessions, great working relationships can be formed and this transpired into productive support work and life skills being gained.

When asked about his time with Campus, Ethan states that the positive relationships, support sessions and life skills have allowed Ethan to successfully manage his own home and tenancy.



Rough Sleepers Project

In 2022 the Rough Sleepers Accommodation Project commenced, a partnership with Hartlepool Borough Council and New Walk CIC to provide eighteen homes for rough sleepers or those at risk of rough sleeping. The people that we have housed have multiple needs of prolific substance use, poor mental health/physical health, poor social networks and a history of tenancy failure.

Of the nine people who were part of this project in 2022 only one is no longer housed by CC87 due to a criminal conviction for which he received a custodial sentence. John who was sent to prison wrote a letter to CC87 stating;

I want to say thankyou for all you did for me, I can't begin to tell you how grateful I am to you (Louise) and Gill for all the effort you put into trying to get me well. It really is appreciated and is something I will never forget **?

Campus Case Study Carrie



Carrie was referred to Community Campus RSAP project as she was homeless and had a long chaotic housing history that led to her not being able to access either private rented or social housing. Her mum had died when she was young and she endured a series of violent relationships which with her drug use resulted in her three children at different times being removed by the local authority and placed in foster care. Carrie has been a tenant since June 2022. In the initial stages, Carrie struggled with trusting the support and engagement was sporadic. However over time, and with perseverance, we have managed to build a solid working relationship with Carrie to the point she feels she can trust and be open and honest with CC87 housing and support workers.

As her engagement improved with ourselves we were able to facilitate and maintain her engagement with other services. Her drug use reduced significantly and has now ceased due to being pregnant understanding that any drug use would be detrimental to the health of her baby. Carrie is determined to do whatever it takes to keep the baby and is working in partnership with Children's Services, she is under no illusion that this may be the last opportunity as she states to be, 'a real mum'.

The relationship with her partner is excellent and there are no concerns regarding domestic violence, her partners family are thrilled to be grandparents for the first time. She has access and regular contact with her two older children now aged 19 and 16 and is hoping to begin contact with her youngest child in the near future.

Carrie maintains her property to a high standard. She has managed her finances well, paying all her bills and ensuring she has enough food until her next payment which is no mean feat in the current economic climate. She has made the conscious effort to personalise the house, purchasing various items to make it feel homely and has also bought all the items required for the new baby. She has recently prepared one of the bedrooms in readiness for the baby coming home. Carrie is feeling happier and more hopeful and confident about the future than she has been for many years which has consequentially had a positive effect on her emotional wellbeing, in her own words,

Unaccompanied Minors

In 2022 we also commenced a project in partnership with Stockton Borough Council to accommodate six unaccompanied asylum seeking children (aged16/17). This initially proved quite challenging as the young people had little or no grasp of English and we communicated through a translation service, google translate, flash cards and sign and body language. The young people are attending an ESOL course at Stockton Riverside College and are becoming much more confident in speaking English and reading English, this is a real achievement as two of the young people had never attended school and could not read in their native language.

Soran was an unaccompanied asylum-seeking child (aged16) when he was referred to CC87 for accommodation and support by Middlesbrough Children's Services. He had been in the country for just three months, had little understanding of English and understandably apprehensive about moving into a shared property in unfamiliar surroundings with new people. Soran enrolled at Middlesbrough College for an ESOL course and quickly learned the language. He engaged well with his housing and support worker and would ask for help whenever it was needed. As Soran's grasp of English increased so did his confidence and ability to do things for himself; managing his accommodation in an exemplary manner, and achieving all of his milestones at college and generally being more independent with less contact time with his housing and support worker.

Soran moved into his own tenancy with CC87, a step before moving into private rented or social housing, this provided new challenges of being responsible for bills himself, managing a budget, maintain a property himself and being a good neighbour. Soran was now over 18 and had little support from the local authority and relied on CC87 staff to ensure he managed this transition successfully.

Soran is now housed in a Thirteen property, he is working full-time and continuing to study at college. He has learnt to drive and purchased a car and has recently got married in Iraq and is saving sufficient money in order that he meets the government threshold for bringing his wife to the UK.

Campus Case Study Ali



66 Louise has been a great support to me over the last 4 years, helping me access College courses, finances and helping me find accommodation in Newcastle 99

Ali was 17 when he was referred to CC87 by Hartlepool Children's Services as part of a protocol with CC87 and Thirteen to accommodate asylum seeking children. He had fled war torn Sudan as he was being pressurised to join one of the army factions in his local region.

Ali's grasp of the English language was still very limited and communication was initially managed by interpreters, flash cards and mobile phone apps. Ali was enrolled on an ESOL course at the local college to improve his understanding of English, he went on to gain his GCSE in English and Maths and completed an Electrical Engineering course.

Ali was very motivated to help others, he volunteered within the local refugee community translating for individuals and organisations, and become involved in the local community playing football for a local Sunday league side.

Ali responded positively to the support that was provided ensuring he was able to access appropriate cultural amenities and food shops, health services, education and benefits. His accommodation was well maintained and by the time Ali left our accommodation he was managing independently of the service. Ali is now living in Newcastle studying Aviation Engineering at Newcastle College - we are very proud of what he has already achieved.

Maximising Income

Forty-eight tenants reported they needed help to claim Universal Credit, housing benefit and other welfare benefits, of these, forty five reported that they had been successful in maximising their income.

Thirty-four tenants reported that they need help to manage money and reduce debt, of these, twenty six stated that they were better managing their income/reducing debt.



Self-Care Skills

Forty four tenants reported that they needed support to better manage their self care and living skills, of these, 40 reported that they had improved their self care and living skills.



Training and work

Twenty-seven tenants reported that they needed support to access training/education and volunteering opportunities, of these, twenty-two stated that they had participated in training/education and volunteering.

Eighteen tenants stated they needed support to gain employment, of these, thirteen were successful in gaining employment.



Health

Thirteen tenants required support to register for GP/dental practice, of these, all thirteen registered with a GP/dental practice.


A small number, twelve, reported that they needed support to improve their physical health, of these, ten stated that their physical health had improved.

Twenty-eight tenants reported that they needed support to better manage their mental health, of these, twenty reported an improvement in their mental health.



Accommodation

All sixty tenants need support to maintain their accommodation and avoid eviction, of these, forty-eight maintained their accommodation and moved onto the housing option of their choice.






Helping Others

Coatham House

We are continuing to assist Coatham House, a small charity based in Redcar that



provides housing and support to young people at risk of homelessness with management services, developing the resilience and governance of the organisation.

The Project continues to make great strides forward and has increased its housing stock enabling it to provide more bed spaces for young people. Its funding position is much stronger which creates stability and opportunities for growth. Redcar and Cleveland Council has shown great trust in the organisation by extending the floating support service to people who are homeless or in temporary accommodation.

Centre for Social Justice Foundation




Along with many other charities we have been working with the Centre for Social Justice Foundation to ensure our experience and the experience of our tenants and service users is used as an evidence base to develop policy reforms that tackle the root causes of poverty and social breakdown. Over the last twelve months we have hosted round table discussions attended by our tenants and apprentices for the Foundation regarding the private rented sector and housing policy and housing and training opportunities. We see this as an important part of our work ensuring the voices of people who are affected by such policies are heard and considered when addressing such important national issues.

Carlisle Key Project

We have continued our working relationship



with the Carlisle Key Project, a small charity that provides housing and support to young people who are homeless or at risk of homelessness through their weekly drop in and supported housing service. The project has gone through some personnel changes and we are working with their management team in relation to strategic funding, developing appropriate policies and procedures and governance.





India

Community Campus continues to support the work of the Anekal Read Centre in Bangalore. The centre works with the most disadvantaged rural and tribal communities in Southern India to create sustainable livelihoods. Over the years we have helped fund the building of two classrooms for Jamboo Savari Dinne Junior School, sent a container of school furniture that was initially marked for disposal, donated and helped build a youth hall in a rural village in Tamil Nadu.





Social Enterprise Mark

Community Campus was re-awarded the Social Enterprise Mark for 2022/2023 after an independent assessment verified by an external panel. The mark is the only Social Enterprise accreditation independently guaranteeing that an organisation is trading for the benefit of people and the planet. The award shows that the organisation is making a real difference ensuring our business model remains ethical and credible.





Care and Repair

In our early years of operation, we employed various contractors to complete repairs on our properties, as the number of properties grew we decided to create our own maintenance and repair service, ensuring we are in control of costs, quality and customer care whilst also meeting one of our aims of creating sustainable employment. The 'Care and Repair' team can now undertake the majority of repairs within our housing stock except for roofing, gas and electrical work. We now take on commissioned work from other organisations from small scale repairs to major refurbishments.

Apprenticeships

In keeping with our mission and values we have created opportunities for four apprenticeships within the care and repair team as a joiner, painter/decorator and multi-skilled. We know from our past experience that apprenticeships have a huge impact on people's lives, not only equipping young people with the skills and experience to move onto permanent employment but also improving resilience, confidence and emotional well-being.

Sam, one of our former apprentices is still employed by CC87 3 years after his apprenticeship ended. We are grateful to the Teesside Charity who have contributed to the funding of the apprentices.

The care and repair team responded to 98 emergency repairs and a further 450 non-emergency jobs throughout 2022

Care & Repair

Our work for Southbank Community Land Trust

In 2022 we won a Thirteen housing tender to refurbish two terraced properties in Southbank on behalf of Southbank Community Land Trust, a community led housing organisation actively involved in local initiatives including the acquisition and refurbishment of empty properties in South Bank. As part of the refurbishment we created opportunities for construction students from Redcar College to gain work experience and enhance their skills on a real live site. This was a learning opportunity for CC87 having to meet all Thirteen's health and safety requirements and submitting risk assessments and method statements for every aspect of the refurbishment. The Land Trust were very happy with the houses that we refurbished and they now provide homes for local families.

Campus Case Study Noah



Noah from Darlington left school with GCSEs in September 2022. He didn't get along in school and was happy to leave and start work in the construction industry. To this end, Noah started an apprenticeship in a 2-year wood manufacturing course. However, this course didn't live up to his expectations, he wasn't enjoying the course and found it boring. He left and started actively looking for employment, but with little success. Noah was now worried about employment and his future.

Whilst looking on the internet he discovered an advertisement for a training opportunity with CC87 in a career in which he was interested. Noah has only been with CC87 for almost six months and it has already had a practical impact on his trade skills. During this period, he states that "I do a bit of everything, joinery, painting and plastering". Noah will use this experience to gain a level 2 qualification in property maintenance. Furthermore, this experience has made Noah "feel good and more confident".

Noah's improved self-confidence has had a major impact on his ambitions for his future, he wants to start his own business in another country such as Spain.

that would not have been available to me and has given me the opportunity to have a better life ??

Nathan's mother died when he was sixteen and he had to go and live with various family members. This ultimately proved unsuccessful and he resorted to staying at his girlfriends home and at friend's. His emotional well being was suffering and he realised without a stable home he would not be able to move on in his life. He approached CC87 for housing and support and we were able to place him in a large shared property where we were able to assess Nathan's support needs and plan for his longer time housing. After successfully working on his tenancy management skills he was moved to a sole tenancy to see if he could manage this extra responsibility. He was initially successful but after his relationship with his long-term partner broke down with her and her family and his major support network, Nathan's mental health began to deteriorate and he stopped engaging with support. This had a negative effect on the way he conducted his tenancy. We agreed with Nathan that it would be best if he spent some time back in the larger shared property where he could receive more support, where he would not be isolated and where he could rebuild his self-confidence. This proved successful and he is now back in his own self-contained accommodation.

Nathan applied for a painting and decorating apprenticeship within our Care and Repair Team for which he was successful and is now five months into his Level 2 Painting and Decorating qualification, studying formally one day a week at Stockton Riverside College. Nathan is thoroughly enjoying this role and his goal is to become fully qualified and work for CC87 permanently.

Campus Case Study Jordau



Campus is much better than when I was at college as I am working and learning on real live sites with people who have loads of experience rather than continually painting the same wall again and again at college

Jordan aged 22. left school with no qualifications and had little idea of what he would like to do in terms of a career. He attended courses in engineering at NETA and a painting and decorating course but these did not lead to any form of employment and he was increasingly becoming frustrated with the lack of opportunities and had a feeling of hopelessness.

Jordan's work coach at the DWP advised him to return to college where he was supported to apply for a multi-skilled apprenticeship with Community Campus. This apprenticeship has a number of elements to it, joinery, basic plumbing, plastering and painting and decorating. Jordan thought the variety of work and skills would keep him motivated and hopefully lead to permanent employment. Jordan has been employed as an apprentice since November 2022, he attends Stockton Riverside College one day a week and for the rest of the week he is part of our Care and Repair team working on empty and void properties, bringing them back into use. He is being mentored by our supervisors who have years of experience in the construction industry who are passing on their knowledge and skills to Jordan.

Jordan thoroughly enjoys his role with Community Campus and is proud that he is helping the organisation to house and support people who experience homelessness.






lan is now 21 and has been employed by Community Campus for three years in our Care and Repair team initially as an apprentice joiner. Ian is a former looked after young person who now resides, after periods of sofa surfing, living with friends/girlfriend, at his grandmothers.

After leaving school lan studied a BTECH in sports science which he completed but failed to find work and after a meeting with a college advisor applied for a six-week course, 'Bright Lights Starting out in the Construction Industry' delivered by a consortium of CC87, British Land, 3:13 and Stockton Borough Council. Ian successfully completed the course and this led him to apply for a joinery apprenticeship at CC87.

After completing his NVQ Level 2 Joinery qualification, lan is now studying for his NVQ Level 3 Joinery. Ian has thoroughly enjoyed his work with CC87 and also feels a sense of accomplishment and pride in being part of a team, ensuring people who experience homelessness have a good home to live in. Ian believes the last three years has been life changing.

lan's goal is to complete his trade qualification, undertake supervisory/leadership training and eventually take a leadership role within CC87.



Moving Forward

Our plans moving forward in 2023 include the refurbishment of two empty properties in Middlesbrough via our Care and Repair team working with our latest cohort of apprentices and college placements. We are continuing to invest in maintaining our stock to a decent standard and help reduce fuel poverty that many of our tenant's experience. Our focus is on our core mission of providing a roof over people's heads alongside a robust network of support to enable the clients we house tackle the issues that present as a barrier for them moving forward towards a better life.

We are working in partnership with Stockton and Redcar local authorities in delivering housing and support to a small number of unaccompanied minors working with a range of stakeholders to help the young people to start to rebuild their lives. We also continue to work with Hartlepool Council on the delivery of homes for those who rough sleep and those at risk of rough sleeping. These partnerships build upon our skills and experiences gained over the last 35 years of front-line delivery to those in housing need across the Tees Valley. We will continue to consider partnership opportunities with local authorities, third sector and likeminded organisations that will help the organisation deliver its core mission and vision.

We have been commissioned to continue to deliver management and governance oversight of Coatham House, a housing charity in Redcar providing supported accommodation and floating support to growing numbers of clients in the town. We are continuing to work with Lloyds Foundation to offer support to charities who are diversifying into housing and look forward, in 2023, to providing support to the Springfield project in Cumbria.

We continue to encourage and support a number of agencies that are working with those in housing need – all we work with are experiencing a massive surge in demand for core housing services.

The government have introduced a regulatory framework for the provision of supported housing for care leavers aged 16 and 17 and we will be applying for registration to OFSTED in the near future. We welcome these regulations as there are too many organisations providing poor quality accommodation and support to our most vulnerable young people.

We will continue to engage with the Centre for Social Justice, Homeless Link and other campaigning organisations to ensure the voice of our clients is heard and they can have direct input into social policy reform.

Our staff teams worked through the pandemic and then straight into a cost of living crisis that has created a very challenging environment for our work and the running of the organisation. The whole staff have shown a magnificent response to those challenges by continuing to deliver quality services to people with ever increasing needs as borne out by this report.
